Dr. William O. Baker, Music Director & Conductor



William O. Baker has earned a reputation as an entrepreneurial conductor and creator of choral organizations. He founded the DeKalb Choral Guild in 1978 at the age of 19. By the age of 21 he had conducted Brahms' *Ein deutsches Requiem*, Vivaldi's *Gloria*, Schubert's *Mass in G*, and Handel's *Messiab* with professional orchestras, launching a career of ambitious artistic leadership that now has extended over 45 years. In the last few years alone he has conducted the *St. Matthew Passion* and the *Mass in B minor* of Bach, and the *Sacred Service* of Ernest Bloch, at the time of the performances the only Kansas City-based conductor to lead the works in over a quarter-century.

Baker created the Atlanta-based William Baker Festival Singers, originally called Gwinnett Festival Singers, in 1985, and established the William Baker Choral Foundation in 1990. In 1998 the conductor moved his home to the Kansas City area and created the Kansas City ensemble of the Festival Singers. The Choral Foundation has created over a dozen ensembles based in three states, involving hundreds of musicians each year. His ensembles have performed for conventions of the American Choral Directors Association, the National Association for Music Education, and the American Guild of Organists, in addition to the 1982 World's Fair and music festivals in the United States and Great Britain, most notably appearances before capacity audiences at Charleston's Piccolo Spoleto Festival since 1989. He has led the Festival Singers in the production of over two dozen nationally released recordings and in television and radio appearances across the nation, including *The First Art*, *The Sounds of Majesty* and National Public Radio's *Performance Today*.

No stranger to the orchestral podium, William Baker created the Mountain Park Wind Symphony in 1994, the Kansas City Wind Symphony in 1998 and Kansas City Bronze in 2018. Primary orchestral performances have included Vivaldi: *The Seasons*, Sibelius: *Finlandia*, Bach: *Brandenburg Concerto No. 2*, Bizet: *Suite L'Arlesienne*, Haydn: *Symphony No. 59 "Fire*," Mozart: *Symphony No. 41*, Beethoven: *Symphony No. 7* and *Symphony No. 9*. Choral collaborations have included projects with members of the Kansas City Symphony, the Kazanetti Chamber Orchestra, the Atlanta Youth Symphony Orchestra, the Kansas City Civic Orchestra, the Baton Rouge Symphony, the Gwinnett Symphony Orchestra, the Charleston Symphony Orchestra and the Orchestra of the American Heartland.



Dr. Baker served as Minister of Music for significant Lutheran, Presbyterian and United Methodist congregations across the South and the Midwest. Major appointments have included the historic Grace United Methodist Church in Midtown Atlanta and The Village Church in suburban Kansas City, the nation's second largest Presbyterian congregation. He presently serves as Music Director for the historic St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Lee's Summit, Missouri. He is the author of two devotional books: *Hearts & Hands & Voices* and *Wonder*, *Love & Praise*. Dr. Baker is co-host of *Choral Conversations*, a monthly podcast with Dr. Jamea Sale.

An Atlanta native, Dr. Baker studied voice and choral conducting at Mercer University and the University of Georgia before culminating his formal education at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago where he earned the Doctor of Musical Arts in Choral Conducting. His accomplishments have been recognized in his home states through proclamations by two Georgia Governors, Joe Frank Harris and Sonny Purdue, by Kansas Governor Jeff Colyer, by United States Congressman Phil Gingrey, by proclamations from the cities of Kansas City, MO and Roeland Park, KS, by the Johnson County (KS) Commission, and by a 2015 proclamation by the State of Georgia House of Representatives. In 2012 he was honored for his contributions to the cultural life of his hometown by the Pro-Mozart Society of Atlanta. In 2015 he was named Conductor Emeritus of The DeKalb Choral Guild. Dr. Baker, his wife Laura and their three grown children, reside in Roeland Park, Kansas.

The William Baker Festival Singers has been hailed by *The Kansas City Star* as "The best of the several volunteer choirs in the city..." Though the membership of the 50-voice semi-professional chorale is comprised entirely of volunteers, a large majority of the singers hold music degrees and many are vocational musicians. It is the mission of the Festival Singers to bring the highest standards of musicianship and professionalism to the realm of volunteer choirs. Celebrating its 25th Anniversary Concert Season, the metro Kansas City-based ensemble has enjoyed numerous triumphs through a tradition of ambitious concerts, recording, touring and broadcasting.

Tours have included performances in some of America's most prestigious venues, including Trinity Wall Street Church in New York City, The National Cathedral and the Basilica of the National Shrine in Washington, DC, the Cathedral Basilica in St. Louis, St. James Cathedral in Chicago, St. Louis Cathedral in New Orleans, the Basilica of the Sacred Heart in Atlanta, and the Kauffman Center for the Performing Arts in Kansas City. Their richness of tone, diversity of programming and expressiveness has won praise from audiences and critics alike. In April 2013 the Festival Singers presented their debut concert in Helzberg Hall, a performance that featured the *Requiem* of Maurice Durufle performed with members of the Kansas City Symphony. John Heuertz, in the *Kansas City Star* said, "It's hard to know where to begin praising this chorus' performance...What came across Thursday night above all was the great warmth in this chorus' singing. It was almost like hearing a family."

The signature repertoire of the William Baker Festival Singers is short-form sacred a cappella classics and spirituals from all eras and cultures. The chorus also performs a major choral/orchestral masterwork each spring. Recent concerts have included the *Requiems* of Faure, Durufle, Mozart, Brahms and Rutter, the *Dona Nobis Pacem* of Vaughan Williams, and the *Laudes Organi* of Kodaly. The Festival Singers own the distinction of being the first Kansas City-based ensemble to perform the *Mass in B minor* and the *St. Matthew Passion* of Bach, in addition to Ernest Bloch's *Avodath Hakodesh (Sacred Service)* in a quarter century.

Megan Moore, Soloist



Megan Moore is an up-and coming singer and conductor in the greater Kansas City community. Originally from the Dallas-Fort Worth area, she graduated summa cum laude from William Jewell College in May 2017, with B.A. degrees in Music, Psychology, and Applied Critical Thought and Inquiry. During her time at Jewell, she studied voice under Dr. Ronald Witzke; served as student conductor for the awardwinning Concert Choir and William Jewell Handbells; and was involved in the Chapel Choir, Choral Scholars, and Schola Cantorum. Additionally, she served as a Choral Scholar for Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral under the direction of John Schaefer and Dr. Paul Meier. Megan has sung in Carnegie Hall with Winthrop University under the direction of Dr. Jeremy Mims, as well as in Texas-based Voci d'Amici, conducted by

Dr. Loyd Hawthorne. Ms. Moore was appointed to the William Baker Festival Singers in 2020, and is now in her third season with the ensemble. Locally, she has also sung with Musica Vocale, Cardinalis, and Songflower Chorale. Additionally, Ms. Moore serves as the Choral Assistant St. Mary's Episcopal Church in downtown Kansas City. She served as Choral Intern for the Kansas City ensembles of the Choral Foundation from 2020-2021.

Ed Frazier Davis, Soloist & Composer

Ed Frazier Davis is an English-American composer, singer, and conductor living and working in Chicago. He served as Composer-in-Residence for the William Baker Choral Foundation from 2016-2022, and was appointed as founding Director of the Institute for Choral Creativity in 2020. He was a member of the William Baker Festival Singers from 2016-2022. He created the Choral Foundation's newest ensemble, Vox Venti, in Chicago in September of last year. Vox Venti is enjoying a most successful inaugural season in 2022-2023.



Lauded for its "compelling, [...] colourful orchestration" (Musical Toronto), Ed's music is poly-stylistic and draws from many eclectic influences, from Medieval song to postminimalism and practically everything in between. He has composed music for a wide variety of media, but as an experienced singer he has a particularly strong affinity for writing choral music. His music has been commissioned and performed throughout the world by many renowned performers and organizations, including Access Contemporary Music, the Aspen Music Festival, Bella Voce, The Crossing, soprano Erin Wall, the Lincoln Trio, PLEXUS, and the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. Ultimately, he seeks to write music that breaks established artistic binaries—e.g. traditional vs. modern, accessible

vs. unfamiliar-to create art that is fulfilling to as wide an audience as possible.

Ed's career has developed considerable momentum in the past few years. From 2012 to 2016, he served as Composer-in-Residence for the Chicago Chamber Choir, the last season of which was under renowned conductor and educator Doreen Rao. In 2014, he was named second place winner of the American Prize in Choral Composition (Student Division), as well as a finalist in Chanticleer's annual student composer competition. In 2015, he received the premiere of his first international commission from the Toronto Symphony Orchestra and Children's Chorus (conducted by Sir Andrew Davis), and was selected as one of four composition fellows at the very first Big Sky Choral Initiative. In 2016, he made his Southern Hemisphere debut with an acclaimed commission from Melbourne-based chamber ensemble PLEXUS.

Kenneth Charles Babcock, 1941-2013 Hero to the William Baker Choral Foundation



The work of an organization like the Choral Foundation would not be possible without the loving and generous encouragement of our heroes. Choral music in the Kansas City area has never had a more faithful friend and supportive hero than Kenneth Charles Babcock. Ken died tragically on January 11, 2013 at the age of 71 in a private plane incident, but his love for his fellow man and the witness of his deep faith lives on.

Ken was a long-time member of the Summer Singers of Kansas City, enjoying the weekly trip to the city with daughters Kenna and Matea. As a member of the Summer Singers, Ken was always sensitive and welcoming to new members around him, offering words of encouragement to both the most experienced and least experienced singers. In the years that his daughter Kenna performed as a member of the Youth Festival Singers of Kansas City, he assisted the staff with rehearsals and was always ready with warm words of blessing for the student members. He was a champion of the Festival Singers

in both Kansas City and Atlanta, hardly ever missing a concert and always ready with expressions of appreciation for the Singers and a joyful response to the music. His generous financial support contributed mightily to the growth of our organization in the last decades, enabling many participants and audience members to be connected to music of timeless beauty and worth.

With the help of Ken's family and many friends, the Board of Trustees of the William Baker Choral Foundation and all members and staff of our organization dedicated the entirety of spring semester of the 2012-2013 concert season in memory of Ken Babcock. The debut performance of the Festival Singers in Helzberg Hall of the Kauffman Center for the Performing Arts on April 11, 2013, an event that Ken had anticipated with great excitement, was designated as the first Kenneth Babcock Memorial Concert.

Today's performance is the eleventh annual memorial concert, and it marks the 25th anniversary season of the William Baker Festival Singers in Kansas City. Prior performances of the Babcock Memorial Concert have included Brahms: *Ein deutsches Requiem*, Mozart: *Coronation Mass* and *Great Mass in C minor*, Bach: *The Passion of Our Lord According to St. Matthew*, Dello Joio: *To St. Cecilia*, Rutter: *Requiem*; Bernstein *Chichester Psalms*, and the world premier of three works by Ed Frazier Davis: *Sweetest Fruit Beyond Human Sense*, *At Our Last Awakening*, and *Seven Last Words from the Cross*. The 2024 Kenneth Babcock Memorial Concert will feature Ralph Vaughan Williams' *Dona Nobis Pacem*, Leonard Bernstein's *Chichester Psalms*, William Dreyfoos' *Songs of the Holocaust* and Benjamin Britten's *Festival Te Deum*.

Ken Babcock was the founder and owner of Ken Babcock Sales, a Hiawatha, Kansas, based company specializing in agricultural construction. In the wake of his loss, the countless friends and colleagues that remember him may prove to be his greatest legacy. "Ken was legendary," said Varga Gladhart, representing Gladhart Farms. "He was a builder of many things...including people." An everyman's king-maker, he seems larger than life because he influenced people each day in ways that changed them forever.

Born December 23, 1941, Ken demonstrated an early inclination toward nurturing potential in things and people around him. An avid nature lover, he received a Master of Science degree in Biology from Emporia State University in 1970. Holding a Bachelor of Science degree in Education as well, Babcock decided to focus on growing people through teaching, a gift evident throughout his life.

"He was a guiding force in my life," said Ken McCauley, former president of the National Corn Growers Association. "People like Ken Babcock make their mark on the world and set the bar very high for the next generation." For those of us left behind we are encouraged to, in Ken Babcock's own, well-remembered words, "Keep the faith!"

A Personal Word

Thank you for joining us for the 25th Anniversary Season of the William Baker Festival Singers, and for the Eleventh Annual Kenneth Babcock Memorial Concert. At this time of celebration I want to express my humble appreciation to you for your encouragement and support, but most of all, for your prayers. No man walks the face of this earth more blessed than I.

For today's performance I have chosen a principal work that has been close to my heart for over four decades, the Ein deutsches Requiem of Johannes Brahms. As a conductor whose performances of this work number in the dozens, I have heard time after time, from audience members, chorus singers, and orchestra players how this music, like no other, has given voice to comfort, assurance, encouragement and hope.

I think it also especially fitting to offer today the Kansas City premier of a work created by our former Composer in Residence, and present director of our Institute for Choral Creativity, Ed Frazier Davis. This brilliant orchestral tone poem was written in memory of Ed's mother, opera star Gianna Rolandi, 1952-2021. There is no greater love than that of a Mother and Child, as Brahms himself testifies in the fifth movement of his Requiem: "I will comfort you as one whom his own mother comforts."

Many years ago, when I was a young man singing in the Atlanta Symphony Chorus under the leadership of my mentor Robert Shaw, the great master wrote a letter to us inspired by Brahms' choral masterpiece. The letter is one of my most precious possessions to this very day. Here is an excerpt:

I suppose the first scriptural enigma any of us memorize as a child is "God is love." In my case it was some years before I realized that there was a possibility that it said exactly what it meant and meant exactly what it said. Not, "God is to **be loved**," or "God **loves**," but "God **is** love. G=L."

At least by analogy (and I would say by absolute coincidence) music is love, and so is a chorus, and so is singing together.

I now invite you to realize -with appropriate wonder- that your participation and your "chorus" are not extra baggage, addendum, or post-script, but provide an involvement and commitment which furnish the only light there is. There is no other meaning. Certainly not in words.

I believe each one of us was created with love and intention. Each one of us was woven together in our mother's womb by our Loving Creator. I believe the breath of Holy Spirit was poured into us that we, too, might love and create. Singing in a chorus is a part of that creation and it is an expression of our own creation. This is why the Festival Singers came to exist, first in Atlanta in 1985, and in Kansas City in 1998. This is why I come before you today to lead the Ein deutsches Requiem and to create its wonders anew in partnership with our chorus, orchestra and soloists, and with you.

Someone asked recently, "Will the Festival Singers be ready to perform the Brahms Requiem on April 16?" "...After all these years of leading it, are you beginning to feel comfortable with it?"

The answer is no. We will never be worthy of it. We will bow before it and struggle against it until that day when our own spirits have been filled with eternal light, and our mortal tongues lie silent and still.

We approach our work rightly only as beggars, and as slaves in chains to these immortal words and sounds. Our worthiness is not found in any performance accomplishment, but in our common love, our shared blessing, and in service to the Spirit Whose love caused Brahms to compose it, inspired each of us to learn it, and gathered us in this sacred place to share it.

The study in progress is documenting 100 young female singers' vocal development over the course of 9 months. In March of 2023, Dr. Sale and Institute for Healthy Singing & Voice Research fellows recently returned from Kapkemich, Kenya, where they helped establish music education in the schools and observe vocal development among adolescent female singers. Jamea is available for group workshops and private consultation through the Institute for Healthy Singing & Voice Research.
